

RELATIVELY RADICAL VOICES

Introduction

What does it mean to be radical? What kinds of beliefs or positions or actions qualify a person as radical? Well, it really depends on the context. Radical is a relative term. It means to support or advocate for changes or actions that are extremely different from the norm, from the “status quo.” It often carries the implication that the person is an extremist, that they are rebellious, that they are dangerous. But what is considered the status quo varies from setting to setting, therefore what is considered radical must vary with it. For instance, at one time in American history, the view that women should have the right to vote, or that a black man should be able to marry a white woman, were considered radical positions, extreme and dangerous to society. So when determining whether or not a person or idea is radical, we must always consider the context.
