### DEBATE GROUPS

1. Were the laws of the Code of Hammurabi fair and just?
  - a. Affirmative: Mariusz Wisniewski, Carlos Lanuza
  - b. Negative: Jeffrey Torres, Ivanna Toro
  - c. Moderator: Angie Castillo Infan, Jayden Rubio

**Description:** The Code of Hammurabi is a controversial topic. It is hailed positively as one of the first written law codes, bringing order to society. However, it is often seen as harsh and backward. Also, while some see it as a milestone and a step forward in the history of justice, others consider the laws to be unjust.

**Suggested Research Topics:** Code of Hammurabi full text, Mosaic Law (Torah Law), other ancient/modern law codes/legal systems, civil law, criminal law, death penalty, death penalty as a deterrent, corporal punishment, retributive justice, lex talionis, eye for an eye, statistics on crime and punishment, criminal justice, social stratification, patriarchy

2. Did geography (the natural environment) contribute more to the growth of civilization than human ingenuity (inventiveness/technology)?

**Description:** Human civilization was heavily dependent on the environment and geography. However, human ingenuity led to the development of technologies that made civilization grow and thrive. So the question is, which was more important, essential, and impactful on early civilizations?

**Suggested Research Topics:** River valley civilizations in Mesopotamia/Egypt/Indian Subcontinent/China, Phoenicians, Indo-Europeans, Assyrians, Austronesians, Bantu Migrations, agricultural surplus, job specialization, nomadic pastoralism, technology, stone/bronze/iron, writing, trade, bureaucracy, religion/philosophy

3. Did ancient societies benefit from the arrival and influence of migrant groups?

  - b. Negative: Alex Pieczonka, Aisha Diallo, Isabella Arevalo

**Description:** People rarely stay in one place. The Ancient and Classical worlds saw the movement of peoples taking place all over the world. Sometimes these movements and migrations led to conflict. Other times they led to beneficial cultural diffusions. So overall, did migrations cause more benefit or detriment?

**Suggested Research Topics:** Phoenicians, Indo-Europeans, Aryans, Bantu, Hyksos, Polynesian Islands, Sea Peoples, Bronze Age Collapse, Writing Systems, War/Conquest, Cultural Diffusion, Assimilation/Acculturation, Indus Valley Civilization, Caste System, Language, Technology, Iron, Chariots, you can even look ahead to Roman and Han China times to talk about the Germanic and Hunnic/Xiongnu migrations/invasions!

4. Would the world have been better off if the Persians had won the Greco-Persian Wars?

**Description:** The Greco-Persian Wars have traditionally been studied from the Greek/European perspective, and seen as a positive development, setting Greece on the path toward a Golden Age that would have a major cultural influence on Rome and by extension the whole of European culture. However, if the Persians had won, it might have been Persian culture, rather than Greek, that became the foundation of the culture of Europe. Would that have been better?

**Suggested Research Topics:** Achaemenid Empire, Cyrus, Darius, Centralized Government, Satraps, Royal Road, Zoroastrianism, Prohibition of Slavery, Cultural Diffusion, Cultural Tolerance, Greco-Persian Wars, Athens, Sparta, Direct Democracy, Athenian Democracy, Delian League, Athenian Empire, Parthenon, Greek Philosophy (Socrates, Plato, Aristotle), Greek Theater, Gender/Sexuality

5. Was Alexander truly great?

**Description:** Alexander of Macedon has traditionally been seen as a celebrated figure in European histories of Western Civilization. He is known as “The Great” after all. But many argue that he was actually not so great after all. This should be considered both in terms of his direct and indirect actions and impact.

**Suggested Research Topics:** Alexander the Great, Philip of Macedon, Darius III, Macedonian Phalanx, Alexander’s tactics, his actions, his behavior, Conquest of Thebes/Egypt/Persia/India, Marriage to Roxanna (and Persian-Greek/Macedonian marriages generally), Alexandria(s), Lighthouse of Alexandria, Hellenistic Kingdoms, Hellenistic Culture, Cultural Diffusion, Archimedes, Pythagoras, Hellenistic Philosophies, overall legacy
